CYCLONE MONTHA'S LANDFALL BEGINS IN ANDHRA



Kakinada: Severe cyclonic storm Montha in the Bay of Bengal has started making landfall near Andhra Pradesh's Kakinada, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said on Tuesday night. Montha means a fragrant flower in Thai language. It will continue to move northnorthwestwards and cross Andhra Pradesh coast between Machilipatnam and Kalingapatnam around Kakinada during next 3-4 hours as a severe cyclonic storm with a maximum sustained wind speed of 90-100 kmph gusting to 110 kmph,

said the weather body IMD in its latest update. The impact of the cyclone is likely to be severe in Kakinada, Krishna, Eluru, East Godavari, West Godavari, Dr BR Ambedkar Konaseema, and Chinturu and Rampachodavaram divisions of Alluri Sitarama Raju district in Andhra Pradesh. The state government has ordered the suspension of all vehicle movement in these seven districts from 8.30 pm on Tuesday to 6 am on Wednesday. The cyclone is likely to affect 403 mandals in 22 districts across the state.

The IMD cautioned that the cyclone may cause damage to standing paddy and vegetable crops in low-lying and inundated areas. Farmers have been advised to drain out excess water from fields wherever possible. People have been urged to stay updated on weather bulletins and follow advisories issued by the administration for safety. To ensure uninterrupted emergency communication, 81 wireless towers and 21 large lamps have been installed. The government has also kept 1,447 earthmovers,

321 drones, and 1,040

chainsaws ready to clear uprooted trees. As part of preparedness measures, 3.6 crore alert messages have been disseminated to resi-


dents across the state. Between 8.30 am and 4 pm, Ulavapadu in Nellore district recorded 12.6 cm of rainfall, followed by Kavali (12.2 cm), Dagadarthi (12 cm), Singarayakonda (10.5 cm), B Kodur (6 cm), and Visakhapatnam and Tuni (2 cm each). During a review meeting, officials informed Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu that Nellore district had recorded the highest rainfall so far.

Montha Intensifies: Red Alert Issued for

: Cyclone Montha is steadily gaining strength as it approaches the coast, having recently intensified into a severe cyclonic storm. In light of the developing situation, authorities have issued a red alert for the state of Andhra Pradesh. Currently located over the west-central Bay of Bengal, Cyclone Montha is tracking north-northwest at a speed of 12 km per hour. As of now, it is approximately 160 km south-southeast of Machilipatnam, 240 km south-southeast of Kakinada, and 320 km south-southwest of Visakhapatnam. Additionally, the cyclone is situated 530 km south-southwest of Gopalpur in Odisha. Meteorological Department officials predict that the storm is expected to make landfall between Machilipatnam and Kalingapatnam, near Kakinada, later this evening or tonight. Wind speeds are anticipated to reach between 90-100 kilometres per hour, with a maximum gust of 110 kilometres per

The minister said that all the officials and public representatives are visiting the field and giving appropriate instructions



to the people. He said that the people of the coastal areas have been shifted to the rehabilitation centers.. and all kinds of arrangements have been made there without any difficulty. He said that along with rice, they are also providing financial assistance of Rs 3000 to the people, which no one has

done in the past. Minister Nara Lokesh said that the CMO is inspecting the cyclone-affected areas across the state and giving instructions to the respective districts from there. He explained that the government is taking all kinds of precautions to ensure that there is no loss of life. He also asked the people to come out only if it is necessary. The impact of these heavy rains for two days will be severe. It is advised not to be careless and take lives. People are requested not to stay under old houses and trees. They should go to safe areas. Minister Kollu Ravindra said that even if the control room is informed, the authorities will move them to rehabilitation centers.

Great danger signal 10 at Kakinada Port as cyclone Montha nears Andhra Pradesh coast

From Our Staff Reporter Kakinada, Oct., 28: Great danger signal number 10 was hoisted at Kakinada Port on Tuesday as the severe cyclone 'Montha' in the Bay of Bengal was hurtling towards the Andhra Pradesh coast. With the cyclone nearing the coast, the Cyclone Warning Centre, Visakhapatnam, directed authorities to replace danger signal seven with 10 at Kakinada Port. The great danger signal is the highest issued to port in times of severe cyclones.

Great danger signal number nine was hoisted at Visakhapatnam, Gang avaram, Kalingapatnam and Bheemunipatnam ports. Great danger signal eight was hoisted at Machili patnam, Nizampatnam, Krishnapatnam Vadarevu ports. According to Andhra Pradesh State Disaster Management Authority (APSDMA), cyclonic storm Montha over the west-central Bay of Bengal has intensified into a severe cyclone and moved north-northwest wards with a speed of 12 kmph during the past six hours. It lies centred about 160 km from Machilipatnam, 240 km from Kakinada and 320 km from Visakhap atnam. The system is being continuously monitored from the Disaster Management Authority's control room The severe cyclone is likely to cross the coast between Kakinada and Machilipatnam tonight. At the time of crossing the coast, strong cyclonic



winds with speeds of 90-110 km per hour. Due to its impact, extremely heavy rainfall is expected from Srikakulam to Nellore, with very heavy rainfall in some areas. APSDMA has advised people to stay safe indoors. The IMD has issued a red alert for coastal Andhra Pradesh. It said in a bulletin that scattered heavy to very heavy with extremely heavy

rainfall likely to occur at one or two places over Srikakulam, Parvathipuram, Manyam, Vizianagaram, Visakha patnam, Alluri Sitharama Raju, Anakapalli, Kakinada-Yanam, B.R.Ambedkar Konaseema, East Godavari. West Godavari, Eluru, NTR, Krishna, Guntur, Palnadu, Bapatla and Prakasam dis-

Will Putin bow to US sanctions?

To defeat the enemy, mere brute force is not enough. The result will be positive only if common sense and tactics are used according to the circumstances. Is it any wonder that it took ten months for the head of state, Trump, who is a hot-headed and thoughtless leader, to realize this? He boasted during his election campaign that stopping Russia's war in Ukraine would be a piece of cake for him. He promised that if he came to power, he would stop the war within twenty-four hours. But it took him so long to realize the fact that Russian President Putin has read four leaves more than him in politics. Putin is trying to negotiate with Trump in the middle of the Ukraine war. Trump's ego was hurt when his face-to-face meeting with Putin in Alaska last August failed to yield any results. He recently imposed sanctions on Russian oil companies to get Putin to back down, who is insisting that he must seize some territory in Ukraine to stop the war.

This development must have shaken Putin. The sanctions imposed by the US and the European Union on Russia's largest oil companies, Rosneft and Lukoil, have had a major impact on Russia, as well as India and China. The sanctions applied to both companies and many companies affiliated with them, causing oil exports from Russia to freeze. The latest sanctions seem to have banned 557 oil shadow companies. The decision taken by the US and European countries has sent crude oil prices soaring. The charges for supertankers transporting oil have increased by 16 percent in a single day, an example of this. This is the first such increase in charges in the last two years. Although Putin is bragging that he will not bow to US sanctions, he is not unaware that if oil purchases stop, it will be impossible to repair an economy already devastated by the war.

The latest sanctions will reduce Russia's ability to fund its military operations. It is undeniable that its oil-dependent economy will be weakened. However, he seems to be in a waitand-see attitude to see how strictly the sanctions will be implemented. Trump, who once praised Putin as a tough guy and a smart guy, seems to have learned Putin's true colors now. When Putin recently canceled a meeting between the two leaders in Budapest, Trump said that was the reason why he was asking what was the point of the talks that did not yield results. As for India, Russia has been buying oil cheaply since the start of the Ukraine war. India imports a third of its crude oil requirements from Russia. India has imported an average of 1.7 million barrels of oil per day so far this year, of which 1.2 million barrels come from the two recently banned companies. Reliance and Nayara Energy are the largest importers of these imports, while Indian public sector undertakings are importing to a lesser extent. According to the International Energy Agency, India imports about seven million barrels of oil from Russia every month. This is equivalent to seven percent of the world's crude and refined oil consumption. In the wake of US sanctions, India is forced to reduce its oil imports from Russia, and it seems that it will once again turn to West Asia. If that happens, the US may reduce the tariffs on India, which have been increased to 50 percent, to 15 percent.

95% Of Gen-Al Projects Are Failing - And Markets Can Smell The Fear

The rapid and competitive surge in investment and media attention around Artificial Intelligence (AI) has led to a resurgence of earlier technological manias, sparking fears that the AI bubble could soon burst. Global institutions like the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the Bank of England and financial leaders such as Jamie Dimon and Ray Dalio have issued cautionary warnings about the same.

They have all brought forth concerns about the inflated AI valuations and the bubble created by AI. But what exactly is fuelling this surge? How does it compare to the infamous Dotcom crash? And what implications could such a burst have on the United States and the global economy?

The AI Mania

The AI sector has witnessed unprecedented capital inflows, with just American private AI investment touching \$109.1 billion in 2025. This, along with investment in dozens of other countries and by other entities, has poured into AI development, data centres, chip manufacturing, and other related infrastructure. The S&P 500's growth in recent months can also, to a certain extent, be linked to AI-related growth.

The above graph indicates that AI has maintained a steady share of about 2% to 3% of the index until 2020. Between 2021 and 2024, its weight in the S&P 500 generally ranged from 3% to 4%. Significant changes in the index began in early 2023, driven by a surge in AI Hard-

This growth was largely fuelled by the growth of the Santa Clara-headquartered chip manufacturer NVIDIA, whose share rose from 1.13% at the end of 2022 to 6.6% by June 30, 2024, reflecting investor optimism that AI will revolutionise productivity and economic

Yet, as cautioned by IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva, current AI-related valuations are approaching levels resembling those seen just before the dot-com crash of

heading toward levels we saw during the bullishness about the internet 25 years ago," she

Many firms still struggle to display meaningful returns and profits from their AI investment. A new Massachusetts Institute of Technology study revealed that approximately 95% of generative AI business efforts are failing, with only 5% achieving meaningful revenue

Even with more than \$44 billion poured into AI startups in the first half of 2025, tangible productivity improvements remain limited as AI continues to face challenges with real-world applications. OpenAI's CEO, Sam Altman, has openly acknowledged this, warning, "In fact, there are many parts of AI that I think are kind of bubbly right now."

AI vs Dot-com

The dot-com bubble of the late 1990s elicited similar excitement around the transformative potential of the internet with companies having minimal revenue commanding sky high valuations based on 'future expectations'. When investor confidence in the same expectations waned in the early 2000s, these firms collapsed, wiping out trillions in market value. The bubble did, however, in its messy aftermath, leave behind vital technological infrastructure, which went on to become the backbone of today's internet, led by survivors such as Google and Amazon. A key difference, however, between the AI bubble and the dot-com craze lies in the source of capital. Many big tech giants are investing heavily into AI from their own profits, unlike the dot-com era startups, which relied on external capital. Bridgewater Associates founder Ray Dalio has also cautioned investors that the current rally in favour of AI stocks is showing signs of "froth". He drew parallels to the speculative fervour of the late-1990s dot-com boom.

He went on to state that while AI's technological trajectory

remains transformative and inevitable, investor expectations have far outpaced the sector's real-world monetisation capacity. "The progress in AI is real, but so is the speculation around it," he noted, leading us to understand the widening disconnect between genuine innovation and inflated market valuations.

What's At Stake?

The United States remains the epicentre of AI innovation and investment, thus making its economy highly sensitive to any and all shifts in AI market dynamics. AI investments accounted for nearly 92% of America's GDP growth in the

economy, already burdened by rising debt and tariffs, the tip it needs to go into recession.

The bursting of the AI bubble could trigger a domino effect, which would lead to a rapid downshift in AI stock valuations, which, in turn, would erode household wealth

and take a huge toll on investor confidence in the market while pulling down overall market indices. It would also lead to companies slashing AI budgets and broader capital expenditures, which would, in turn, slow innovation and dampen productivity growth.

A sudden slowdown in AIrelated sectors would also most likely trigger layoffs and downward pressure on wages, particularly in technology-driven regions where employment and income growth have become heavily dependent on the AI

Globally, an AI bubble burst could lead to a weakening of funds toward safer assets, leading to an amplification of the exchange and liquidity pressure. The IMF and other major financial institutions have come out cautioning that current equity valuations are precariously stretched. The world economy at this very moment

faces a "triple risk" scenario emanating from the United States, involving tariffs, the AI bubble, and mounting debt burdens, all of which threaten medium-term growth pros-

The Battle For The Ballot Cannot Hide Bihar's Bitter Economic Truth

As Bihar heads to the polls on November 6 and 11, the contest is being pitched as a battle for identity, justice, and governance. But no matter which side wins—the NDA led by the BJP-JD(U) combine, the opposition Mahagathbandhan under the RJD-Congress, or the insurgent Jan Suraaj of Prashant Kishor—the victor will confront the same cruel truth: Bihar's growth story is a political illusion that hides deep economic despair.

The state's highways gleam, its GDP gallops, and its leaders boast of double-digit growth. Yet beneath the concrete and statistics lies a starker Biharone that exports its youth, imports its subsidies, and still ranks near the bottom in human development.

The campaign is loud, but the silence on Bihar's structural crisis is deafening.

The Election Arithmetic: Jobs, Caste, and a Crisis of Credibility

The 2025 Assembly polls are shaping up as a referendum on two decades of Nitish Kumar's rule, with his credibility as "Sushasan Babu" now fraying. Anti-incumbency, fatigue, and frustration with joblessness are giving the opposition oxygen it hasn't had in years.

At the heart of this election lies one overwhelming issue: unemployment. Bihar's youth joblessness rate hovers around 13-15%, one of the highest in India. Each year, more than two million Biharis migrate out of the state for work — to Delhi's construction sites, Punjab's farms, or the Gulf's labour markets.

Tejashwi Yadav has turned

this into a rallying cry, promising 10 lakh government jobs, while the NDA counters with promises of industrial incentives and five lakh private-sector jobs under Nitish's "Sushasan" model. The conversation has shifted from caste to careers — what social media now calls a "youth revolt."

Still, neither side has explained how those jobs will be created in a state where industry contributes barely 21.5% of GSDP, manufacturing is stagnant, and agricultural employment remains disguised under subsistence.

Bihar's economy, expected to reach?10.97 lakh crore (US\$130 billion) by 2025-26, has indeed grown rapidly - a compound annual rate of 11.4% over the past decade. Yet its per capita income of ?59,637 remains onethird of India's average, a gap that mocks the "double-engine" slogan of the BJP-JD(U) alliance.

Caste: The Old Code in a New Contest

Caste arithmetic still frames the contest, but this time, it's layered with class anxieties. The RJD's Yadav-Muslim base faces off against JD(U)'s EBC-OBC coalition and the BJP's upper-caste bastions, while Prashant Kishor's Jan Suraaj seeks to lure disillusioned youth with a "caste-neutral" plank.

The Congress has revived its demand for a caste census and Pasmanda (backward Muslim) inclusion, sharpening identity politics under the guise of equity. The NDA counters with its stability narrative, portraying itself as the only guarantor of "development without divi-

But beneath these alignments lies a hard reality: caste still decides who gets to govern, not how Bihar is governed. The EBC and OBC blocs, long courted as swing voters, remain economically stagnant — and deeply cynical about elite politics on both sides.

Infrastructure and the Illusion of Progress

The NDA's campaign has revolved around infrastructure — new highways, power capacity, and bridges as proof of progress. The government boasts of 1.17 lakh km of rural roads, 57 railway projects worth ?15,987 crore, a ?3,402 crore metro in Patna, and 7,895 MW of installed electricity capacity.

But infrastructure does not automatically equal prosperity. Bihar's Gross Fixed Capital Formation, a proxy for productive investment, remains at a meagre 4.7% of GSDP, among India's lowest.

Factories haven't followed the highways. The state still accounts for less than 1% of national manufacturing output. Rural Bihar, where 70% of the workforce depends on agriculture, faces recurring floods, rising input costs, and falling real incomes. The government's talk of "development" rings hollow in East Champaran, Madhubani, or Sitamarhi, where irrigation remains erratic and flood management projects are perpetually "under implementation."

For most voters, Bihar's development has been something to look at, not to live in.

Corruption and the Battle for Moral High Ground



Corruption, once the NDA's weapon against Lalu Prasad Yadav's "Jungle Raj," has come back to haunt it. Opposition parties cite land scams, unfulfilled job promises, and rising costs of living as proof that Nitish Kumar's clean-governance halo has faded.

The JD(U) itself is fraying — 11 leaders were expelled this year for "anti-party activity," exposing internal unrest. The BJP's central leadership, meanwhile, has turned the Bihar polls into a prestige battle, with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Amit Shah, and Nadda leading aggressive campaigns.

But even as the rhetoric escalates, voters sense little difference between the corruption of yesterday and the complacency of today.

The Bihar Economic Survey 2024–25 bluntly notes: "Committed expenditures — salaries, pensions, and interest payments — severely constrain developmental spending." In plain terms, Bihar spends more on paying its past than building its future.

Debt, Dependence, and

Delhi's Grip

Bihar's fiscal spine is fragile. Nearly three-fourths of its revenue comes from Delhi through Finance Commission transfers and grants. Its own tax revenue of ?59,520 crore (FY25) cannot even cover administrative costs.

The state's debt-to-GSDP ratio, at nearly 40%, is among India's highest. Interest payments have skyrocketed from ?3 crore in 1999 to ?23,838 crore in 2021, crowding out welfare and education.

The NCAER's 2025 report warns that Bihar's debt "is sustainable only under optimistic growth and transfer assumptions." That's bureaucratic code for "one shock away from

This dependency gives Delhi a veto over Patna's priorities. The NDA's campaign slogan of "double-engine growth" thus cuts both ways — a boast when convenient, a burden when not.

Voter Rolls, Women, and the Politics of Perception

Officials urged to implement all precautionary measures

Nandval: District Collector G. Rajakumari has urged the people of Nandyal district to remain alert in view of the impending Montha cyclone, which is likely to cause heavy rains across the region for the next three days. Chairing a review meeting with district officials at the PGRS Hall in the Collectorate on Monday, the Collector directed all departments to stay on high alert and implement precautionary measures to prevent loss of life and property. The meeting was attended by Joint Collector K. Karthik, DRO Ramu Naik, special deputy collectors, and other officials. Speaking on the occasion,

the Collector said the cyclone is expected to cross the coast between Kakinada and Visakhapatnam, with its impact extending to Nandyal district. She advised farmers, particularly those cultivating onion, maize, and tomato, to temporarily postpone crop harvesting to avoid damage

State Labour Minister Vasamshetty Subhash instructed Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Konaseema District Collector Mahesh Kumar Ravirala to ensure full preparedness to face Cyclone Montha and to work collectively so that people do not panic. 



Surya Kumar Yadav is a great leader, says coach Gautam Gambhir

Hyderabad: "Surya (Kumar Yadav) is a great human being, and good humans make good leaders. While he speaks highly of me, my role is simply to advise him fairly based on my reading of the game," says Indian cricket team's head coach Gautam Gambhir.

"Ultimately, this is his team. His free-spirited character perfectly matches T20 cricket's essence, which is about freedom and expression. Your off-field personality reflects on the field and in the dressing room, and Surya has maintained this atmosphere brilliantly over the past 1.5 years," Gambhir said in a chat on JioStar.

"From our first conversation, we agreed: we will not fear losing. I don't aim to be the most successful coach; I want us to be the most fearless team. In big games like the Asia Cup final, I told the players it's okay to drop a catch, play a bad shot, or bowl a poor delivery. Human beings make mistakes," he added. "Only the opinions of those in the dressing room matter. Surya and I consistently agree: we will never fear mistakes. The bigger the game, the more fearless and aggressive we must be. A conservative approach only gives the opposition an advantage. With the talent we have, if we play fearlessly, we will be fine," Gambhir



said. •On Suryakumar Yadav's form with the bat, Gambhir said: "Honestly, Surya's batting form doesn't concern me because we have committed to an ultraaggressive template in our dressing room. When you embrace this philosophy, failures are inevitable."

"It would be easy for Surya to score 40 runs off 30 balls and avoid criticism, but we have collectively decided that it's acceptable to fail while pursuing this approach. Currently, Abhishek Sharma is in good form and has maintained it throughout the Asia Cup. When Surya finds his rhythm, he will shoulder the responsibility accordingly," he said. "In T20 cricket, our focus isn't on individual runs but on the brand of cricket we want to play. With our aggressive style, batters may fail more often, but impact ultimately matters more than mere runs," Gambhir said.

"Got Phone Call Saying Be Lenient, It's India": Ex ICC Referee's Big Claim Involving Sourav Ganguly



Former ICC match referee Chris Broad has levelled serious allegations against the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI), asserting that political influence was used to protect the Indian team from penalties during his tenure. Broad, who is also the father of retired England pacer Stuart Broad, detailed these claims in an interview. Broad claimed that he received a direct phone call instructing him to be "lenient" and find ways to spare the Indian team, being led by Sourav Ganguly, from a slow over-rate fine in one particular match. Without delving into specifics, Broad noted that India were three or four overs down at the end of the game, an offence which constituted an automatic fine. Because of the pressure from the BCCI, Broad said he had to comply,

manipulating the elapsed time to bring the over-rate below the fine threshold. •In his interview, Broad further claimed that the sport has become significantly more political now than in his early days as an official. With the BCCI being the main financial driving force, Broad alleged that top positions in the ICC have become much more politically charged. "India got all the money and have now taken over the ICC so in many ways. I'm pleased I'm not around because it's a much more political position now than it ever has been," Broad told the Telegraph. Narrating the slow over-rate episode, Broad revealed how the phone call effectively forced him to be lenient with Team India. The incident involved an Indian team match where Sourav Ganguly was the captain. On

another occasion involving Ganguly, however, Broad said that he stood by the laws and penalised the team. "India were three, four overs down at the end of a game so it constituted a fine. I got a phone call saying, 'be lenient, find some time because it's India'. And it's like, right, OK. So we had to find some time, brought it down below the threshold. The very next game, exactly the same thing happened. He [Sourav Ganguly] didn't listen to any of the hurry-ups and so I phoned and said, 'what do you want me to do now?' and I was told 'just do him'. So there were politics involved, right from the start. A lot of the guys now are either politically more savvy or just keeping the head below the parapet. I don't know," Broad claimed.

India U20 women draw 1-1 with Kazakhstan in second friendly

Shymkent, Kazakhstan: The India U20 women's team drew 1-1 against Kazakhstan U19 in the second and final friendly at the BIIK Sports Complex in Shymkent, Kazakhstan. Both goals came in the second half. Adeliya Bekkozhina handed the lead to the hosts in the 47th minute before Pooja, scoring her second goal in as many games, equalised in the 55th. As part of their preparations for the AFC U20 Women's Asian Cup 2026, the Young Tigresses played two friendly matches against Kazakhstan U19 in Shymkent. India won the first friendly 3-2.
